Summer is here and wow do we have manyprojectshappeningaroundthecity. Let's start with three very large projects: (1) The Wastewater treatment expansion project is over 70% complete. This project is a \$21 million dollar expansion of its treatment operations that will serve our community for several decades. The expansion nearly doubles the amount of intake that can be treated. It will enable a cleaner output to the environment. It includes a new laboratory for water samplings, and it doubled the size of our electronic control facility. Substantial completion is scheduled for December 2023. (2) We are finishing up phase 2 of our southern force main wastewater collection line. Nearly half of our customers contribute wastewater materials from their homes and businesses into our southern force main. From a study two years ago of our whole system we learned that the southern force main was nearly at full capacity. We had a

ond collection line to expand our abilities to receive additional growth of the southern half of the city. The estimated price tag for this project was just over \$7 million. With the help of federal and state dollars and a contribution from a private developer we were able to raise over \$5 million to help offset the cost of the project. Phase 3 of this project will begin this summer. The full project scope runs a new 20-inch line from our treatment plant on Industrial drive to behind Loves travel center. The line continues under interstate 65 to Sage road near Crossroads medical. It follows Sage road to US31W. From there it continues down Cedarbrook to Dorris Farm in Willow Springs subdivision. We are hopeful we can finish all phases of the project by December 2024. (3) The most expensive project to date for the city is in the early stage of construction. The finishing touch to the City government campus is a 72,000 square foot recreation center. This concept design drawn up to run a sec- new facility came with a price tag of

nearly \$24 million. Now that we have the old gymnasium of our old city hall stabilized, Romach, our contractor, can move full speed ahead on construction of the new recreation center. As of this writing we are looking at a completion date of November 2024.

Often staff get asked about what plans they have for improving roads in the city. That is a good question because long-term planning is very important to the city. Each of our departments is required to have a six-year capital improvement plan which is formally placed into our budget books available to the public each year. Attending to roads is the responsibility of two departments. Our Public Services Department has a division we call public works. This division is responsible for maintaining all the traffic-controlled intersections. Making sure lights that are out get replaced and to make sure that cameras or in-ground loops are functioning properly so that traffic flows efficiently through the city. They fill potholes that get reported to them. They also have a responsibility to evaluate roads and determine which roads should be paved. For the past several years we have spent approximately \$500,000 a year to pave roads.

Expanding road capacity or overseeing the building of new roads fall under the responsibility of myself and our city engineer. Arterial road and collector road expansion is very costly and takes years

to plan and construct. We have over twenty projects in the pipeline at various stages. Projects have four phases. Concept design/environmental, Design, Right-of-way, and Construction. We have put together a spreadsheet so that you can see the projects we are working on presently. They are listed in no specific order. The Type of Work section tells you what phase the project is currently in. Funded would mean that that the project has funds to do that phase. We are just finishing up the paperwork on the US31W/Sage Road/ McCurdy Road intersection so we will be able to check that off as finished. A very important safety project that will be under construction this summer is the White House High School Heritage Road extension. To help alleviate pressure on the two intersections at SR76 on either side of the school we asked and was approved by Robertson County School Board and Robertson County Commission to build an extension road from where their drive ends at the north end of the football stadium to Pinson Road. This will give a safer access point to enter school property for all the students and parents that live north of the school and drive to and from school activities.



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Waste Management of Tennessee purchases GFL-Nashville and what this means for White House Residents

WM of Tennessee purchased GFL-Nashville, effective May 1, 2023. The addition of GFL-Nashville will enable WM to improve routing efficiencies while servicing the combined residential, commercial and industrial routes throughout Middle Tennessee.

What does this mean for the residents of White House?

• Within the next year, all solid waste and recycle carts should be transitioned out with Waste Management carts. We would ask for your patience during this time, as lead times for replacement carts are on backorder.

- Pick-up time will start at 6am, if possible, carts should be put at the curbside the night before pick-up.
- WM will offer and supply reverse 411 capability through either texts or push notifications through their app. The city will continue to send push notifications through our app to support public outreach efforts.
- If for some reason your cart is not picked up by WM, your cart will be tagged with an explanation.
- Collection crews will not pick up spills or litter resulting

from unbagged garbage, overfilled containers, or scavenging.

- Do not place garbage on the ground or on top of an automated container.
- Lids must be closed completely.







Spring is in full force here in White House! With the beautiful spring weather emerging, yard sales, and of course growing grass become more prevalent.

One of the duties of the Code Enforcement staff is to administer the city's sign ordinance. Residential and commercial property owners/tenants can apply for temporary and staff approved permanent sign permits for their property. Our staff will review the application and issue the permit, as long as it fits

In this 'Planners Corner' series, we will explore how the Code Enforcement Staff keeps White House beautiful, focusing on city signage and property maintenance.

within the guidelines of the zoning ordinance in section 4.070. This can be found on the city's website (https://www.whitehousetn.gov/government/zoning-ordinance). Some of the criteria reviewed for the signs include location and size.

The city also of-Temporary Sign Permits: White House Zoning Ordinance, Section 4.070 Standards for Signs, Item I:

Temporary Site Signs- Any business, individual, or organization may display one (1) banner sign per lot. In the case of multiple tenants per lot than no more than two (2) signs will be permitted at any one time. The signs must be separated by at least twenty-five (25) feet.

The sign or signs can be placed a maximum of four (4) times a year not exceeding twenty-eight (28) days in any calendar year, with twenty-one (21) days between permits. A sign permit shall be obtained each time a banner is placed on site. A temporary banner sign shall not exceed twenty (20) square feet in area. The location and height of banner signs shall be in accordance with the White House Zoning Ordinance. Temporary Event and Advertising Signs pursuant to this section shall be required to have a permit issued without fee from the Planning and Codes Department"

Any illegal signage that is placed around the city without a sign permit, such as off-premise advertisements, will be removed by


Code Enforcement staff. This is done in an effort to keep White House beautiful. Old yard sale signs left out days after the sale, become litter. We ask that those advertising their yard sale be respectful of our city ordinances. We ask that you remove signage after the event. Other illegal signage to be

aware of, include pennant banners, inflatable "air dancers," and flag signs (without the proper permit).

In a further effort to keep the city beautiful, the Code Enforcement staff has also been busy enforcing overgrown grass this spring. Besides being an eyesore to neighbors, it can also block driver visibility at intersections and even harvest unwanted insects/critters.

If grass/weeds exceed twelve inches in height, the property owner will be notified via certified mail and/or a notification posted on the property. After which the owner will have ten business days to remedy the violation. If this is not accomplished within that timeframe, the owner will then be cited to court and the judge would make a ruling. Our staff welcomes citizens to notify us if there is an overgrown or dirty lot that needs attention. This can be done via telephone call to the Planning and Codes office (615-672-4350 ext. 2120). You can also send a notification through the city website (www.whitehousetn.gov) to Report an Issue. This is an excellent tool for citizens, as it allows us to communicate and respond to notify that an issue has been addressed along with details involving the issue.
