

# Greetings FROM YOUR CITY ADMINISTRATOR Gerald O. Herman

In the last two issues of this newsletter the topic of growth in residential, commercial, and industrial was shared with you. What needs to be covered in this issue is "what connects" these areas together. How do we travel between places in and out of the city of White House?

Maintaining and expanding our transportation network must be planned, takes many years to design and construct, and is very costly to the budget. The City receives State Street Aid money from the State based on per capita. We bring in roughly a half million dollars each year which we use to resurface streets. We have been successful in receiving alternative transportation grants sidewalks along State routes. We havebeen successful in receiving two Industrial Access grants for two small projects in the Industrial zoned areas. We were successful in having a project to widen SR76 from Hester Drive to New Hall Road widened to four lanes in the 2017 IMPROVE ACT. (Since there were 900 or so projects approved it could be another 10 to 15 years before TDOT moves the project into the concept design phase!). We can expect TDOT to continue with the widening of I-65 from the Kentucky line down to Goodlettsville. (This is a four-phase project. White House is

scheduled the of the four last phases.) All roads built subdivisions are built by the developers. How do we fund widening roads and improving intersections on roads that connect subdivisions? We have used a variety of means. For example, when the Parks subdivision was proposed we required the developer to rebuild and reroute a part of Pinson Road from Pleasant Grove Road to Cross Plains Road. We required the developers of the new subdivisions along Tyree Springs Road to work together to improve the intersection of Tyree Springs at South Palmers Chapel Road to include turn lanes and traffic signalization. We also collect an Impact Fee that does help to offset some costs on these types of projects.

Last month staff proposed to the Board of Mayor and Alderman six (6) road improvement projects. If funded these six projects could be built out over the next two at most three years. Our projected costs for these projects are nearly \$11 million. To pay for these projects staff proposed borrowing the funds and paying them off in 12 years. Currently the City has no debt service on any road projects. Here are the six projects proposed and the reasoning behind each project:

### Pleasant Grove Road @ State Route 76

Although this project is listed in the IMPROVE Act, waiting 10 to 20 years to get some improvement at this intersection is not feasible. Two traffic studies at this intersection have shown that turn lanes on SR 76 along with traffic signalization are warranted. Design plans have been developed. We are in the process of obtaining right of way and relocation of any utility. This project has been identified by the Board of Mayor and Alderman as a priority project. Estimated cost is \$1.8 million. If funded, we anticipate we could go into construction by end of calendar year.



#### Sage Road Widening Final Phase

Sage Road has become a secondary bypass road that connects US31W to SR76. Widening improvements were split into three phases. The first phase was from SR76 to Madeline Lane. The second phase was from Madeline Lane to Cardinal (the point where the road changes from north south to east west). The third phase will widen the road from Cardinal to US31W. This third phase is extremely important to complete. We have a new sewer line that is being installed along the entire length of this phase. It would be helpful to the residents along this road to get the road done shortly after the sewer line work is complete. Also, soon Cedarbrook Road will be opened and connect to Tyree Springs Road. Opening this passage extends the bypass, which we anticipate will increase traffic along Sage Road. This phase cost estimate is \$1.8 million.



### Calista Road Widening Phase 1

This project will widen Calista Road from Indian Ridge Blvd to Bill Moss Road. This section of road is currently in the early design phase. There are four subdivisions with over 1,000 homes being built in that area. One developer has agreed to give \$500,000 toward this project. Estimated cost for this project is \$2.6 million.



### **North Palmers Chapel Road Widening**

This project would widen North Palmers Chapel Road from Tyree Springs to the bridge over the greenway. This project has been designed. Right of Way and relocation of utilities have been completed. This project just needs funding. Estimated cost is just over \$800,000.



### Union Road @SR76.

This intersection has been studied and warrants turn lanes and a traffic signal. This project is along the IMPROVE Act SR76 corridor. This intersection is #1 in crash rate in the City limits. It is #2 in the total reported crashes and is #2 in the severity of crashes. This is a very dangerous intersection that needs improvement as soon as possible. A private developer will install traffic signalization as soon as we can get the widening and turn lanes finished. Estimated cost of this project is \$1.7 million.



### Marlin Road @ US31W

This project would include turn lanes and traffic signalization. It currently warrants a traffic signal. There is development in residential, commercial business and a new intermediate elementary school in this area that is now and will continue to impact the amount of traffic at that intersection.



We do know and are planning for other future road projects, but staff has recognized that these six projects are of higher importance and are ready or near ready for construction. May you be safe, happy, healthy, and ready to grasp the warmer weather of spring.

### MORE ON MODERNIZING OUR LAND USE REGULATIONS

In my last post, I briefly touched on the City's project to update its land use regulations. The comprehensive update to local land regulations was 1995, nearly 30 years ago when visitors still flocked to the Opryland USA theme park and White House had a mere population of 5,000 residents. Three decades later and more than 10,000 residents stronger, there is a need to update and modernize regulations to ensure that White House continues to guide future growth and development in alignment with the City's goals and objectives. And of course, staff, residents, developers, and elected officials alike are eager for regulations that are clear, concise, and understandable.





**Elements of the update will address:** 

·Zoning - Rules that define how property in specific geographic zones can be used by regulating lot size, placement, density, the height of structures, etc. to guide growth and development that aligns with the comprehensive plan.


<u>Subdivision regulations</u> - Development standards and procedures for the subdivision of land within the City to ensure that new subdivisions are consistent, predictable, and protect the health, safety, and general welfare of the community.

•<u>Design standards</u> – Guide for façade, doors and windows, roof, and site for commercial development within the City to ensure that properties are consistent, high quality, and promote the general welfare of the community.

•<u>Sign</u> - Regulations for exterior signs within the City to reduce hazards, protect public investment, facilitate an attractive and harmonious community, and further economic development.

Since January 2024, city staff have worked with consultants to review issues with the existing land use regulations and identify potential solutions to address them. We look forward to sharing this assessment and gathering input from the community in the near future to shape the next regulations for decades to come.

### Firefighter of the Year-2023

Here at the White House Fire Dept, we recently wrapped up our annual banquet, which due to some nasty weather, was delayed a bit. But, a huge shout out to both our Administrative Assistant, Vicky Vaughn (aka, "The Commissioner") and Mrs. Tabitha Brewer. These two ladies worked tirelessly to make our banquet a very special occasion, and it only gets better every year!

As is typical, the highlight of the banquet is bestowing one of our firefighters with the Firefighter of the Year award. This award is given to firefighters whom have truly excelled throughout the year, those who go above and beyond expectations, improve their skillset, and distinguish themselves from their peers. This individual has exceeded expectations, shown a lot of initiative, and continues to develop as a leader....

### Our 2023 Firefighter of the Year is C-shift's own, Billy Gaull.

Billy comes to us from Spring Valley, IL. He attended college at Illinois Valley Community



College, and later Rockford University, majoring in Sports Management and minoring in Business Administration. At Rockford, he played basketball. Billy's early career aspirations were obtaining Strength & Conditioning certifications and owning his own gym. (More on this in a moment...)

Prior to joining the fire service, Billy worked in retail management. In 2019, his wife's career opportunities brought them south to Tennessee. A friend in his hometown had recommended the fire service, but Billy did not pursue those opportunities right away. While managing a failing GNC Nutrition store, Billy turned the store around and made it profitable and thriving once again. However, the cold reception and indifference of upper management to this accomplishment made him rethink his priorities. He then made the decision to pursue a fire service career.

While continuing to work in retail management, Billy joined the Highland Volunteer Fire Dept. and

obtained his initial certifications. He then applied and interview for several area departments, ultimately landing in White House. Since joining the department, Billy has obtained numerous certifications.



including; Firefighter I&II, Aerial Apparatus Operator, Fire Instructor, and Fire Officer I. Besides being a gifted athlete, Billy seems to have a natural penchant for firefighting, like he was meant to be here all along!

Billy's future goals include continuing to learn and stay proficient, even pursuing a few different skillsets, maybe moving into supervisory roles down the road. As mentioned before, Billy's initial life goals revolved around strength & conditioning. Currently, he is working towards a certification with the National Strength and Conditioning Association (NSCA), with the goal of becoming a Tactical Strength and Conditioning Facilitator. (TSAC-F). ### **Wastewater Collections Systems**

The City of White House Wastewater Department operates one of the most technologically diverse wastewater collections systems within the state of Tennessee. Our system consists of the traditional gravity networks (buried lines that flow freely under the force of

gravity), low-pressure grinder pumps (powered pumps that move wastewater through pressurized lines), and even vacuum sewer systems that pull water and air through pipes. However, all these moving parts mean that equipment can become clogged or damaged if materials get flushed that they aren't designed to process. Every drop of water that goes down the drain in our system eventually gets pumped to our Wastewater Treatment Plant, which could potentially damaged by foreign objects. To avoid service interruptions and costly repairs, please avoid flushing the following types of items:

 Baby Wipes or "Flushable Wipes" (Flushable wipes are NOT sewer safe, even if the label says so!)

Plastic Objects

Fireplace Ashes

Cotton Items

Disposable Gloves

Paper/Plastic Food Wrappers

Cooking Fat, Lard, Oil, Grease, etc.

- Strong Chemicals and Caustic or Poisonous Substances
- Shop Towels
- Feminine Products
- Degreasing Solvents
- Cigarette Butts
- Q-Tips
- Cat Litter
- Glass, Metal, Wood, Eggshells, Seafood Shells. Coffee Beans, Aguarium Rocks/Gravels, etc. (all of these are abrasive and cause physical damage to pumps)

If you have any questions at all about how your sewer system functions in White House, contact your Wastewater Department at 615-672-3654! Also, please call this number for any and all sewer repair needs. We monitor our phone lines 24 hours a day and always have personnel on-call to handle any and all after-hours/weekend/holiday emergency needs.


### Changes to Trash and **Recycling Services PUBLIC SERVICES**

With the current growth within The City of White House, it has been deemed necessary to make some changes to our current trash and recycle schedules. The

Waste Management Team in cooperation with The City of White House, will be making adjustments to the trash and recycling pick up days. Making these changes are what we believe to be the best option as our city grows. This will increase efficiency and allow Waste Management to absorb the additional growth we are experiencing. Trash collection days will remain the same for most citizens and for others only slight changes will occur. The biggest change that will occur is, recycling collection day will no longer be on Friday's and will not be collected based on the county in which you reside. While all citizens will still be collected twice per month for recycling, the new schedule will require that every other trash day citizens will put their recycling cart out to the curbside with the trash cart. These recycling weeks will be considered either odd weeks or even weeks of the month that will correspond with the day in which recycling will be collected.

### Backdoor Service Trash and Recycling Services

Currently, citizens that are receiving backdoor service trash and recycling services are serviced on Thursdays; moving forward citizens with backdoor service will be serviced on Tuesdays and similar to curbside collection these citizens will need to put their recycling cart out to be collected every other week with their trash carts.


