



This **census** is vital for our community because it determines funding, **resources**, services and planning for our **future**.



In 2020, the U.S. Census reported nearly 13,000 residents in the City of White House. However, current estimates suggest the population is closer to 19,000. This updated count could significantly increase state funding for the city, benefiting every man, woman, and child who resides here. Accurate population data translates directly into more resources—potentially boosting funding by nearly \$1 million annually.


To achieve this, a Special Census is scheduled. Here's how you can help shape the future of White House:

February 19, 2025: The U.S. Census Bureau will send invitations to households, encouraging responses via the Internet Self-Response (ISR) system.




April 1, 2025: Census takers will begin visiting homes that have not submitted online responses.

June 3, 2025: The collection period will conclude, ensuring every resident is counted.

rectly contributing to the development and growth of our community.


How and When the Census Will Be Conducted

We will start with an online response phase this month. The U.S. Census Bureau will mail invitations to all housing units, encouraging citizens to submit their responses online through the Internet Self-Response (ISR) system. This phase will last until the end of March and will be supplemented with multiple reminder mailings to encourage participation.

Certification and Final Reporting

Once the census is complete, the collected data will be compiled, reviewed, and prepared for certification.

Club, spending time with residents at Charter Senior Living, where I enjoy calling bingo and visiting with friends.







The Planners Corner

In the 'Planners Corner' series, we will explore how the Code Enforcement Staff keep White House beautiful, focusing on city signage and property maintenance.

With the explosive growth occurring in the City of White House, it is essential to examine the broader context of regional growth in Nashville. Over the past few decades, Nashville has transformed from a modest city into a dynamic metropolitan hub, attracting people and businesses from across the nation.

This rapid expansion has been fueled by a combination of factors, including strategic regional planning, infrastructure investments, and the successful recruitment of major industries. The Nashville Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA), which includes Sumner County (White House), has become a powerhouse of economic and cultural activity, driving unprecedented growth in residential, commercial, and industrial sectors.

White House has directly benefited from this regional surge, capitalizing on its strategic location along Interstate 65 and its proximity to Nashville. As growth in the Nashville core and surrounding counties continues to push outward, White House has emerged as a prime destination for new residents seeking a balance between urban amenities and a suburban lifestyle.


Nashville's rise as a national economic leader, combined with deliberate regional collaboration, has created a ripple effect. This has spurred development not only in downtown Nashville but also in neighboring communities like White House. The result is a thriving regional ecosystem where job opportunities, quality of life, and economic prosperity are advancing in tandem.

White House benefits from its geography, standing out as the "last frontier" for growth in the Nashville Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA). Unlike other cities around Nashville, where terrain challenges or limited land constrain expansion, White House offers significant development potential.

As a transplant to the area for 19 years, I have come to better understand the 'how and why' behind the region's explosive growth. Nashville's transformation began in 1963 with the consolidation of the City of Nashville and Davidson County into Metro Nashville. This merger laid the groundwork for widespread economic and residential development, not just in Nashville but across its surrounding counties.


Nashville MSA Overview

The Nashville MSA comprises 13 counties, each contributing to the region's growth. Since the 1960s, areas like Bellevue, Madison, Antioch, and Priest Lake have expanded, with development spilling over into neighboring counties.

City of White House Growth Trends



The City of White House is experiencing a remarkable period of transformation, driven by sustained regional and local growth. Over the decades, this once-small town has blossomed into a thriving community, shaped by strategic planning and its proximity to the booming Nashville Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA). Starting in the late 1970s, White House leaders initiated the process of long-range planning, laying the foundation for the city's continued development and success.

- Pre-1960: The city's population, under 1,000, was concentrated along Springfield Rd (State Route 76), Star Memorial (Hwy 31W), and Tyree Springs Rd.
- 1960–1990: The construction of the interstate system improved access to Nashville, leading to steady residential growth, surpassing 1,000 housing units by 1990.
- 1990–2020: As Nashville's suburbs expanded, White House grew from 3,000 residents to nearly 13,000, averaging over 300 new

residents annually.

• 2020s: Growth has accelerated, with over 1,000 new residents annually, driven by residential, commercial, and industrial development.

Catalysts for Regional Growth

In 1989, the "Project 2000", initiative laid the foundation for recruiting and retaining businesses in the region. This effort, combined with the establishment of landmarks like the Tennessee Titans, Nashville Predators, and major corporate headquarters, fueled the region's economic boom. White House's growth reflects these regional dynamics and its proactive policies.

Development Highlights

- 1996–2007: 1,842 single and multifamily permits issued.
- 2017–2020: A downturn resulted in only 439 single-family permits, but growth resumed, culminating in a record 579 permits in fiscal year 2024.
- Outlook: Major developments approved between 2015 and 2021 are expected to conclude by

2028, supported by traffic improvement projects to address congestion and safety.

White House's growth is a direct reflection of these regional dynamics, bolstered by the city's proactive policies to accommodate expansion. However, the rapid and simultaneous growth has prompted local officials to pause and reevaluate infrastructure needs to support the city's evolution. Key initiatives include the expansion of the sewer treatment plant and significant traffic improvement projects to address the challenges of a growing population and increased activity. This deliberate approach ensures that White House continues to thrive while maintaining its livability and meeting the demands of its growing community.

To ensure winter fire safety at home, prioritize keeping flammable materials away from heat sources, regularly inspect heating appliances, practice candle safety, have a fire escape plan, and always

Key winter fire safety tips:



Get your furnace and chimney professionally inspected annually.

Keep anything flammable at least 3 feet away from fireplaces, space heaters, and



ensure your smoke alarms are radiators. working properly; never use your oven to heat your home • and always turn off space heaters when leaving a room.

Winter is Tennessee's most dangerous season for residential structure fires. Fire departments report a 66% increase in home fire deaths during • winter compared to other seasons. Smoking and cooking account for more than 28% of the known causes for residen-

Clean vents regularly to prevent carbon monoxide buildup.

Space heater safety:

- Never leave a space heater unattended.
- Plug space heaters directly into an outlet, never use extension cords.

Turn off space heaters when leaving a room or going to bed.

Candle safety:

- Place candles on a stable. heat-resistant surface.
- Keep candles away from curtains, flammable materials. and children.
- Extinguish candles before leaving a room or going to bed.

Cooking safety:

- Stay in the kitchen while cooking, especially when frying or grilling.
- Keep pot handles turned inward to prevent accidental spills.

Smoke alarms:

- Test smoke alarms monthly and replace batteries as needed.
- Ensure smoke alarms are installed on every level of your home, inside bedrooms, and outside

sleeping areas.

Fire escape plan:

Practice a fire escape plan with your family, identifying two exits from each room and a designated meeting place outside.

Other important points:

- Never use your oven to heat your home.
- Do not use gasoline or other flammable liquids to start a fire.
- If you suspect a carbon monoxide leak, leave the house immediately and call emergency services.

STAY HOME. ONLY GO OUT IF NECESSARY. EVEN IF YOU CAN DRIVE WELL IN BAD WEATHER, IT'S BETTER TO AVOID TAKING UNNECESSARY RISKS BY **VENTURING OUT.**

DRIVE SLOWLY. ALWAYS ADJUST YOUR SPEED DOWN TO ACCOUNT FOR LOWER TRACTION WHEN DRIVING ON SNOW OR ICE.

ACCELERATE AND DECELERATE SLOWLY, APPLY THE GAS SLOWLY TO REGAIN TRACTION AND AVOID SKIDS. DON'T TRY TO GET MOVING IN A HURRY AND TAKE TIME TO SLOW DOWN FOR A STOPLIGHT. REMEMBER: IT TAKES LONGER TO SLOW DOWN ON ICY ROADS.

INCREASE YOUR FOLLOWING DISTANCE TO FIVE TO SIX SECONDS. THIS INCREASED MARGIN OF SAFETY WILL PROVIDE THE LONGER DISTANCE NEEDED IF YOU HAVE TO STOP.

NOW YOUR BRAKES, WHETHER YOU HAVE ANTILOCK BRAKES OR NOT, KEEP THE HEEL OF YOUR FOOT ON THE FLOOR AND USE THE BALL OF YOUR FOOT TO APPLY FIRM, STEADY PRESSURE ON THE BRAKE PEDAL.

OON'T STOP IF YOU CAN AVOID IT. THERE'S A BIG DIFFERENCE IN THE AMOUNT OF INERTIA IT TAKES TO START MOVING FROM A FULL STOP VERSUS HOW MUCH IT TAKES TO GET MOVING WHILE STILL ROLLING.

WINTER DRIVING TIPS

COLD WEATHER TIPS:

KEEP A BUNDLE OF COLD-WEATHER GEAR IN YOUR CAR. SUCH AS EXTRA FOOD AND WATER, WARM CLOTHING, A FLASHLIGHT, A GLASS SCRAPER, BLANKETS, MEDICATIONS, AND MORE.

MAKE CERTAIN YOUR TIRES ARE PROPERLY INFLATED AND HAVE PLENTY OF TREAD.

KEEP AT LEAST HALF A TANK OF FUEL IN YOUR VEHICLE AT ALL TIMES.

NEVER WARM UP A VEHICLE IN AN ENCLOSED AREA, SUCH AS A GARAGE.

DO NOT USE CRUISE CONTROL WHEN DRIVING ON ANY SLIPPERY SURFACE, SUCH AS ON ICE AND SNOW.

TIPS FOR LONG-DISTANCE WINTER TRIPS:

BE PREPARED: HAVE YOUR VEHICLE CHECKED BY AN APPROVED AUTO REPAIR FACILITY BEFORE HITTING THE ROAD.

CHECK THE WEATHER: CHECK THE WEATHER ALONG YOUR ROUTE AND WHEN POSSIBLE, DELAY YOUR TRIP IF BAD WEATHER IS EXPECTED.

STAY CONNECTED: BEFORE HITTING THE ROAD, NOTIFY OTHERS AND LET THEM KNOW YOUR ROUTE, DESTINATION, AND ESTIMATED TIME OF ARRIVAL.


