requires

that the beginning of a new decade a Census of the people must be taken. It is imperative that every person in the City of White House is counted. Federal and State funding to cities is many times reliant on the number of people living in the city. The gasoline tax or as we call it (state street aid) is strictly related to the number of people in our City. We use these funds to pave our city streets. You would think it would be in direct proportion to how many miles you have in city streets but that is not how the distribution of funds is allocated in our State.

Having pointed this out, one could begin to understand why high density in a city is more efficient than low density. Low density requires more miles of streets and utilities extended to service the needs of fewer people. Look at our county roads for example. There are miles and miles of rural county roads that have very few tax paying property owners living on these roads to pay for them. The county receives their share of state street aid based on population. Ask your county road superintendent how many of the roads they can pave in

a given year and I can assure they will share with you great frustration.

Pinson Lane in our City was a county road that our City annexed in several years ago before the recession. The road was in poor shape at the time and all it did was continue to deteriorate over the next decade. We had only a couple of city tax paying residents on that street. The City had greater asphalt repaying needs on streets with greater density. With development of "The Parks" the road was rebuilt and reshaped. When the developments along Pinson Road gets built out, instead of just having a couple of city tax paying residents, the potential of a couple of thousand city tax paying residents will live near and travel that road. The cost per foot of road resurfacing will go way down. Instead of hoping that your road will be repaved every fifty to sixty years it will be reduced to every twelve to twenty years. When you add in the less miles of running sewer, water, gas, electric, and internet service you can see why density is more efficient.

Your City leaders on both the Board of Mayor and Alderman and the Planning Commission make difficult decisions when it comes to how and where density of residential areas should be higher and lower. In 2018/19 the City embarked on a mission to update the Comprehensive Master Plan. This document can be found on our City web site under Planning and Codes. The areas with the highest density starts in the town center and the lowest density areas

are in the fringe areas of the City and in the growth regional boundary areas just outside our City limits. All the subdivisions either built or under current construction fell within the previous master plans and zoning ordinances. The new plan is very precise in the distribution of density.

The leaders have also learned from their experience what needed to be tweaked in the zoning code to enhance the quality of life in these subdivisions. For example, they require sidewalks for walkability in new subdivisions. Preserved open spaces for community

activities. They have placed the front yard setback of single family homes to 35 feet to accommodate larger vehicles in the driveways that do not hang over and block sidewalks. The work they do is stressful and plentiful. The Board of Mayor and Alderman receive a very small salary of just over \$4,000 a year for all the meetings and outings they attend throughout the year. The Planning Commission serves strictly from the heart with no salary attached! Wishing you the best in this New Year (• •

Hear the BEEP where you SLEEP

Every Bedroom Needs a Working Smoke Alarm!

Half of home fire deaths happen between 11 p.m. and 7 a.m., when most people are asleep.

The days are getting longer as winter nears an end. On March 8th, the time will change, and that means it's time to give your smoke detectors some attention. It is recommended that you change the batteries in your smoke detectors at least once a year. The changing of the clocks is a perfect reminder that those batteries may need to be changed. Here are some other tips for smoke detectors and the safety of your family. Stay Safe White House!



Test alarms at least once a month by pushing the test button.



Replace all smoke alarms when they are 10 years old or if they do not sound when tested.



Some people, especially children and older adults, may need help to wake up. Make sure someone will wake them if the smoke alarm sounds.



When the smoke alarm sounds, get outside and stay outside. Go to your outside meeting place.


- •Creative Writing: 1st Tuesday of each month starting at 4:30pm.
